I think it my duty to acquaint Your Majesty that we are arriv'd so far upon our journey, after having undergone a great deal of fatigue from the excessive heat of the weather which, I am sorry to say, has had some effect upon His Royal Highness's health, as He felt some small degree of fever on the day after His arrival here, & which has returned again this morning, & seems to indicate a disposition to His old complaint, the Ague. It is however no small consolation that we are so far got upon our Journey, so that there is no reason for hurrying ourselves, as the camps do not take place before the 16th of next month: We have luckily very good assistance here. The Doctor is extremely attentive to His Royal Highness

& feels very much distressed on account of His illness
I have however the satisfaction to assure Your Majesty
that the attack is of the slightest kind, & that
the Doctor gives me great hopes that it will be
of no consequence whatever, & of very short duration.

I shall not fail to let Your Majesty hear from me
by the next opportunity, when I scatter myself I shall
be enabled to send Your Majesty a favourable account.

I regret very much that His Royal Highness could
not be persuaded to listen to Your Majesty's advice
& recommendation to take some medical man with
Him, it wd not only have been of great comfort to
Himself, but particularly so to those who have the
honour to be placed about His Person.
