My Lord Yesterday I received through the Channel of Lord Southampton the enclosed letter, which you will perceive is neither satisfactory, nor giving up the idea of going abroad; but the sentence alluding to the letter I last year wrote to Colonel Holham, and the only explanation Lord Southampton could make, seems to point out that the D. of Wales is in the utmost distress on account of his Debts; that as yet he cannot bring himself to ask my assistance, but that this at present is likely to be the mode pursued; though Pride and Vanity prevent his doing it immediately yet he must take that step as the only possible means of extricating himself. Therefore I cannot see any reason for longer detaining you from Buxton, which I hope will prove as advantageous as on the former Occasion.

When the D. of Wales makes any direct application to me, it will be very difficult to find a proper mode of reinstating his Affairs, for his Debts are enormous; but I shall certainly on that head take no step but with the concurrence of the Treasury, as it is far beyond my means without Parliamentary assistance.
