I have had the honour of laying the Command in Chief your Letter of the 24th November in which several Circumstances are adverted to, as being peculiar to the nature of the Command in the Island of Guernsey, and I have now much pleasure in obeying the Commands I have received to signify to you the satisfaction which His Royal Highness has experienced in the perusal of that able statement.

The endeavours which have been made to remove all jealousies on the part of the Inhabitants towards His Majesty's Troops, and to satisfy them that it is in common with themselves, and with a perfect attention to their Interests that the operations of defence will be carried on, merits the Commander in Chief's entire approbation and the harmony and Co-operation which have

resulted from that Line of Conduct impress
upon His Royal Highness a conviction that the
Efforts which it may become necessary to make
under your Command against the attempts of
the Enemy will terminate in a manner the
most satisfactory.
