Lord John Thynne presents His Compts to Gen^l
Turner, begs to acknowledge the receipt of His Letter
containing the Memorial & Petition, of the Church-
wardens, & Overseers, of the Parish of Newmarket
with respect to the Building called The Lord Chamberlains
Office - and asks Him for His Royal Highness
the Prince Regent's Information, the recommendation
of Mr Wyatt, the Surveyor Gen^l, upon the state of
repair of that Building, upon which the several
notices (also enclosed) have been given for the Persons
inhabiting the same to quit the Premises.

N^o 6 dated Ap^l 23rd 1811 Lord John Thynne referred to Mr
Wyatt & upon his report, ¹⁸¹⁷ He felt it his Duty to order
The Letter N^o 8 to be written, giving the inhabitants a
further time till the 10th July, beyond which time He did
not consider He could consent to their remaining without
endangering their Lives from the Building falling down

Lord John Thynne says to Mr. Turner & Gen^l
Turner, that the Idea of pulling down the Building
originated with Mr Wyatt; in a Letter dated July 9th 1807
after a General Survey; that Mr Wyatt could not be

interested in giving that advice, & that it was the Duty
of the Lord Chamberlains Office to act upon that infor-
mation. but on the other hand the Church Wardens &
Overseers are interested in having their Poor Persons
provided with lodging free of expence, as they would
be under the necessity of providing Lodging for them
