My Dear Colonel

At the General Meeting of the Bath  
& West of England Society, of which the Prince Regent  
is Patron, I was requested to intimate the anxious  
wishes of that Body, that His Royal Highness would  
be graciously pleased to permit, that, in the event  
of an adequate claim being made for the  
Princes Pension, for the year, the amount  
might be applied to the general purposes of  
the Society, in the same manner as the same  
amount in the ordinary Pensions are usually

at the request of the Society, as to secure the  
order of depositing their papers upon this occasion,  
I wish to ask you, my dear Colonel, to make

hold about ten days hence.

At the same time I wish to request you to  
examine the list of papers, and I have, at  
length, secured intelligence that the cases con-  
cerning the Street Papers have been conveyed  
to White No. 12 & de la Rue & More Street

in England. The persons employed in their  
respective business have conducted themselves  
very negligently, at the expense of many their lives  
& the circumstances connected with, I am persuaded,  
you find satisfactory to the Prince. I wish not  
to detail them - but will be glad to hear  
of the result of the cases in England.

I wish by you to be called, & present the  
Honour of my duty to his Royal Highness  
and that you will believe me to be, with
