To the King's Most Excellent Majesty

The Humble Petition of Wilson Braddyll
of Braddyll and Brockhole and of
Bonishedd Priory in the County Palatine
of Lancaster Esquire, Colonel of the Third
Regiment of Royal Lancashire Militia,
Eldesr Son of John Gale of Whitehaven
in the County of Cumberland Esquire,
who was the only son and Heir of
William Gale Esquire, by Margaret
his Wife, Daughter and Coheir of
Christopher Richmond of Highhead
castle in the said County of Cum-
berland Esquire, the son of
Christopher Richmond and Inabel
his first Wife, who was the Daughter
and Heir of John Vaux of Catterlane
in the aforesaid County of Cumberland
Esquire;

Sheweth

That the said John Vaux, the
Maternal Ancestor of Your Majesty's Petitioner,
was descended from the ancient Family of
Vaux Barons of Gillesland in the said County
of Cumberland, by various Intermariages
with the ancient and noble Family of
Delamar, whose Ancestor John Delamar
was summoned to Parliament among the
Barons of the Realm in the 27th year of the
Reign

Reign of King Edward the First, (and to various succeeding Parliaments, whereby a Barony in Fee was created descendible to Heirs General: and also with the Noble Family of Leyburne, of which Family was William de Leyburne, who was summoned to Parliament among the Barons of the Realm in the aforesaid 27th Year of the Reign of Your Majesty's Royal Predecessor King Edward the First, and John De Leyburne who was summoned among the Peers of the Realm by Writ bearing date the 21st of June in the Eleventh Year of the Reign of King Edward the Third.

That the several Armorial Bearings of the aforesaid ancient Families of Vaux, Delamar, and Leyburne, are, in right of his descent from the said noble Families, quartered by your Majesty's Petitioner, as appears by the Records of your Majesty's College of Arms; from which Circumstance your Petitioner conceives himself entitled to one or both of the aforesaid Baronies of Delamar and Leyburne: but your Majesty's Petitioner being at present unable from the length of time that has elapsed since the writs of summons to Parliament were granted to the aforesaid Families, and from the loss, among many others, of several important Evidences, which your

Petitioner's

Petitioner's Family sustained during the Civil Wars, from their Loyalty and Attachment to your Majesty's august Ancestors of the Royal House of Lancaster, to prove his Right to either of the said Baronies

Your Majesty's Petitioner therefore Most Humbly Prays, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased, in consideration of his said Descent, to revive the said Honours in your Petitioner's Family, by conferring upon your Petitioner the Dignity of a Baron of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.
