Sir

A considerable period has elapsed since I presumed to trouble you with an humble representation of my situation. I've laid before his Royal Highness the Prince Regent. My health is very uncertain but my wishes are not unreasonable & a small security for the future time of greater anxiety or suffering which that future may bring is all I look to; but I hope that the only person, personally attached to Mr. Fox, & left by him in a totally destitute state, who does not rely on any Party, but on the benevolence

ence of his Royal Highness, I trust
his excellent sentiments of justice for
consideration, may obtain a few moments
of his royal consideration.

I add, that I have no wish to be impor-
tunate, & as my wants are small, none
to be unreasonable, and that his Royal
Highness will have the satisfaction of
fulfilling the intentions of Mr Fox
in my case however humble, & however
otherwise perfectly unworthy of his
Royal Highness's notice.
