Successor to my Father in the high and
confidential situation he held with the
Catholics of Ireland it is my anxious wish
to prevent His Royal Highness from being
embarrassed by that Body. I have done
much and shall continue my exertions for
that purpose

Selections being one of those to prevent the
Petition. I have been applied to respecting
promises made by his Grace The Duke of
Bedford when Lord Lieutenant by the

Authority of His Royal Highness seeing much
inconvenience and no possible good from making
these sort of things public I have refused
answering any questions on the subject
my Father is too much indisposed to be
shaken to this objection from a party in
England, I neither expect, or, wish for the
honour of an answer I write to assure you
of my firm loyal and faithful attachment
to His Royal Highness and my Ancestors
wish to act in this and every other
business in such a way as to obtain your
approbation which will be highly gratifying
to me.
