Our Bill would have been read a second time but Lord Cadogan has got it put off till Monday in order that he may present a Petition from Mr. Agar against the principle of the Bill and also from Mr. Postman and the Commissioners of Sewers have presented a like petition these being all against the principle and brought forward in its early stage are evidently meant to try their joint strength - if they are beat handsomely I think there will be an end to their opposition - we must therefore exert all our energy - if you will permit me to write the note on the other side to the Lords mark'd on your list I will do so and send them or if you will sketch me out some other pattern the great object is to get our friends down by four as they will (no doubt) theirs -
