In obedience to the Commands of your
Royal Highness, Lord Mulgrave most
humbly states the Grounds of his Concurrence
in the written Opinion submitted to your
Royal Highness through the Earl of Liverpool.
A very great Diversity of Opinion being
manifest amongst the Confidential Servants
of your Royal Highness, in discussing the
Question of a further Negotiation with the
Marquis Wellesley and Mr Canning, Lord
Mulgrave became strongly persuaded that
any further Attempt to bring about the
proposed Union, would not be attended
with a Result beneficial to your Royal
Highnesses Service; because with such Diversity
of Opinion, and under the various
circumstances

Circumstances which had intervened, it
did not appear that Negotiation could
be further pursued, in a Way likely to
afford the Prospect of Establishing an
Administration, in any respect stronger
than that which had been deemed
insufficient by the Address of the House
of Commons, presented to your Royal
Highness
