My Dear Colonel,

Altho I took my leave on Sunday, yet having been delayed in Town until this Day, I must once more wish you all happiness. And by the by give me leave to mention, my sincere intimate Friend Gen^l. Hervey an old 44th Man, He served with me all that long Story from Braddock to Amherst. He desired me to say He would confirm & speak in my favor wherever call'd upon, & to say He lamented, not being personally known to Col. M^r. Mahon, as He could say much to the Honor & Character of your humble servant. My dear Col. this was so flattering from so good a little Man, that you must pardon me for mentioning it, in the Hope you might come across him. He is Lord Bristol's Uncle & I think is known to the Prince, Lrd. Liverpool is married to his Niece to whom I am known. The Bishop of Meath well knows the friendly & confidential regard the D. of Portland had for me. Pardon me for taking up so much of your time in mentioning so many respectable Characters to whom I was known.

But my wish is, that you might stand on good grounds, by feeling confident of the propriety in interceding with the Prince in my favor. - I did not mention to you that some of the Irish Conspirators wish'd to retire, thro' that Channel it might be thought not too presuming in me to look to that opening, especially when taken up by the Prince.
