Mr Villiers' is - & the conclu-
ding Paragraph of his letter is
so satisfactory that I cannot
help transcribing it exactly.

details, permit me to say that
your reply to the Commissioners
Report, contains a substantial jus-
tification of every part of your
conduct in these concerns, & that
the remarks which I have taken
the liberty to make, apply to
you only, if they are of any
value"
