My dearest Son. It is a Pleasure to take up the Pen when it is to convey Congratulations upon a Succession of such glorious News as You have of late Communicated to me in so kind a manner. The Surrender of General Angereau with a Corps of 2000 Men to the Russians is the Strongest proof of Discontent in the Enemy's Army, & the Necessity may have induced the General ^{to} such a Step, I can not think it would have been ~~at all~~ executed ifi Napoleons Downfall was not foreseen by His own Friends if one may call them by that Name who are forced to Surrender Him: and You have my Sincerest Prayers & wishes that this may be followed up with an Account of the Tyrants Personal Fall as soon as Possible.

I am very sorry to learn that the Gout still continues upon You, & hope that during this very Severe weather You will take care not to expose

yourself too soon into the Cold Air. I shall with
great Pleasure come to Town on Tuesday next, when
I hope to find You better & to assure You by
word of Mouth how Sincerely I am
