Your friendly note of yesterday respecting the removal of my boy has given us the greatest pleasure, it being highly satisfactory for us to know he is once more among his estimable friends.

I am sure from the Interest you have so kindly evinced for him, you will be happy to learn that in thirteen actions in which he has carried the Colours of the 87<sup>th</sup> Reg<sup>t</sup>, he has conducted himself to the entire Satisfaction of his friends, and that he was so fortunate as to discover the evacuation of Toulouse, by the french, he being in the advance on Picquet's Guard at Night, under the walls of a convent, when he communicated the information to a field Officer in his Regt, and the Army enter'd early in the Morning; his letters are most satisfactory, and I

= am happy to say that Colonel Campbell and Lt.  
Colonel Allan of the 94<sup>th</sup> wrote me a most  
flattering account of him a few days ago  
from Bourdeaux, requesting I would endeavour  
to get him back to their Reg<sup>t</sup>, so that, your  
kindness has given satisfaction to all  
parties. - With our united respectful
