Sir

The gracious permission
to address you with which your Royal
Highness has honored me will not
be abused by any humbly soliciting your
protection for Captain Curzon, son to
Lord Leasdale. He undergoes a heavy
mortification by being obliged to re-

-linguish his situation as one of my Lieut
-r-camps; the climate having so severely
-affected him that the Physicians pro-
-bid his longer stay in India. This
is not the worst of his position. He
has had too convincing proof that
his Constitution is unequal to the
exertions of a Military Life, & he

must turn his thoughts to another career: Educated abroad & speaking foreign languages perfectly, he naturally turns his thoughts to the Diplomatic line. I am not trespassing so unjustifiably on Your Royal Highness as to venture a petition for your immediate patronage to

Curzon in that object. The support which
his father has given to his interests will
probably make his introduction easy.

I only entreat that your Royal
Highness will deign to look on Col
Curzon, should he be launched in

that course of business, as a young
man of excellent character &
conduct who may be relied upon as
