At the Council Chamber Whitehall
 the 16th July 1821.

By the Right Honourable
 the Lords of the Committee
 of Council appointed
 to consider of His Majesty's
 Coronation.

The Lords of the Committee
 appointed to consider of the
 Preparations necessary to
 be made for the Coronation
 of Your Majesty having
 again this day met in
 the Council Chamber do
 agree humbly to state to
 Your Majesty, That the
 Lord Chief Justice of the
 Court of King's Bench
 having represented to Their
 Lordships on behalf of
 himself, and the Judges
 of the different Courts,
 That

That the situation
 allotted to them in the
 Procession was not their
 proper Place being below
 the Knights of the Bath.
 And it appearing to Their
 Lordships that it has been
 decided by Your Majesty's
 Predecessors that Baronets
 should take Place of
 Knights of the Bath; That
 the Younger Sons of Viscounts
 and Barons should take
 place of Baronets, and
 that the Judges and Barons
 of the Exchequer should
 take place of the younger
 Sons of Viscounts and
 Barons, Their Lordships
 humbly submit to Your
 Majesty the propriety of
 restoring to the Judges and
 Barons of the Exchequer
 the place they held in
 former Processions

(notwithstanding

(notwithstanding the Deviation from that practice which had been inadvertently introduced on more recent occasions) and of directing, that they should walk immediately before the Privy Counsellors.

And Your Majesty having been pleased to refer unto this Committee the Petitions of several Persons who claim a Right to attend Your Majesty's Coronation and to perform Services there, and of others who request permission to attend at that Ceremony, The Lords of the Committee have considered thereof, and do agree humbly to lay the same before Your Majesty with their Opinion thereupon—vizt—

As to the Petition of
James Earl of Ormonde
and Osory praying to
be permitted as Chief
Butler of Ireland to
perform on the day of
the Coronation, the right
of his said Office, similar
Services to those performed
by the Chief Butler of
England, and that he may
in like manner have,
receive and enjoy a Gold
Bason and Civer as
adjudged to the said Chief
Butler of England; The
Lords of the Committee
humbly beg leave to refer
the same to Your Majesty's
Royal Pleasure.

As to the Petition of
William Henry Marquis
of Anglesey, setting forth
that Your Majesty has
been graciously pleased
to

to appoint the Petitioner
to officiate as Lord High
Steward at the ensuing
Solemnity of Your Majesty's
Coronation; And therefore
praying that he may have
and enjoy all Rights,
Privileges and Advantages
belonging to the said
Appointment in as full
ample and beneficial a
manner as any of his
Predecessors in the said
Office have ever had and
enjoyed or ought to have
held and enjoyed; The
Lords of the Committee
humbly beg leave to refer
the same to Your Majesty's
Royal Pleasure.

As to the Petition of
James Duke of Montrose
claiming as Master of the
Horse to be Serjeant of
the

the Silver Scullery and
 to take an Assay of Your
 Majesty's Meat at the
 Kitchen Dresser in like
 manner as the Duke
 of Albemarle, the Lord
 Dartmouth, Henry de
 Nassau Sieur D' Auverquerque,
 the Duke of Somerset,
 Richard, Earl of
 Scarborough, and John
 the Duke of Rutland,
 and that he may receive,
 and enjoy all the Fees,
 Profits and Advantages
 thereunto belonging, Their
 Lordships are of Opinion
 that Your Majesty maybe
 pleased to allow of the
 Service to be performed
 by the Petitioner as hath
 been formerly granted to
 the respective Masters
 of the Horse for the time
 being;

As to the Petition of
 Sir Patrick Walker
 Gentleman Usher of the
 White Rod, praying
 that the Insignia of his
 Office may be delivered
 to him; The Lords of the
 Committee are humbly of
 Opinion that the same
 Insignia should be issued
 to him as are delivered to
 the Usher of the Green Rod.

As to the Petition of
 Charles Earl of Shrewsbury
 claiming to perform either
 by himself or Deputy on
 the day of Your Majesty's
 Coronation the Duties
 attached to the Office of
 Steward of all Ireland
 for so many Generations
 held by his Ancestors, and
 to enjoy all Rights and
 Privileges thereunto
 annexed, and to perform
 in conjunction with the
 Lord

Lord High Steward of
England all such Services
as the said Lord High
Steward of England
hath been accustomed
to perform or shall perform
on the day of Your Majesty's
Coronation; The Lords of the
Committee are of opinion
that the same should be
postponed.

As to the Petition of
Sir Christopher Robinson,
Your Majesty's Advocate
General, praying that he
may be permitted to attend
on the approaching Solemnity
in such Order and Place
as Your Majesty may be
graciously pleased to
appoint; The Lords of
the Committee are of
opinion that the same
should be postponed.

As

As to the Petition of
Sir William Rae Bart.,
Your Majesty's Advocate
of Scotland, and of the
Right Honourable David
Boyle, Lord Justice Clerk
of Scotland for themselves,
and in behalf of the Officers
of the Crown of Scotland,
praying that there may
be assigned to the Petitioners
such a Place at the approaching
Ceremony of Your Majesty's
Coronation as to Your Majesty
may graciously appear to
be proper; The Lords of
the Committee are of opinion
that the same should be
postponed.

As to the further
Petition of Patrick
O'Hanlon Esq. praying
to be permitted to bear the
Royal Standard of Ireland
at Your Majesty's Coronation;

The Lords of the Committee
are of opinion that the
same should be postponed.

As to the Petition
of James Stamp Sutton
Cooke lawfully descended
in the Protestant Line
from the Royal House of
Plantagenet, praying to
be allowed such a Seat
or Post at Your Majesty's
Coronation as he presumes
his illustrious Birth
entitles him to; The Lords
of the Committee are of
opinion that the same
should be disallowed.

The Lords of the
Committee beg leave to
state to Your Majesty,
That in the cases of which
they have humbly
recommended to Your
Majesty

Majesty to postpone the
Consideration, they have
not intended to intimate
an opinion adverse to
the Rights of the several
Parties bringing forward
such Claims, but have
generally recommended
their Postponement either
because there did not
appear to them sufficient
ground to propose to Your
Majesty to deviate from
the Precedent established
at the last Coronation, or
because sufficient Evidence
was not produced at this
time in their support.

Their Lordships further
humbly inform Your
Majesty, That they have
issued such Orders as
were given by the
Committee on the last
Coronation

Coronation, and such
further Orders as have
been judged necessary
to be forthwith put in
Execution.
