The public will see by this statement how unavailing all engagements and all acts of Parliament hitherto passed have been to prevent the system of incurring debts, but the distresses of the country now command some effective prohibitory checks, and we trust Parliament will not separate without supplying them; although from the vote for the payment of the Russian debts, for the reduction of Guadaloupe, and the aids to Holland, there is too much reason to fear that the Senate and the public entertain different views as to the necessity of economy, and that the public must encounter the awful trial of a protracted system of profusion and prodigal.

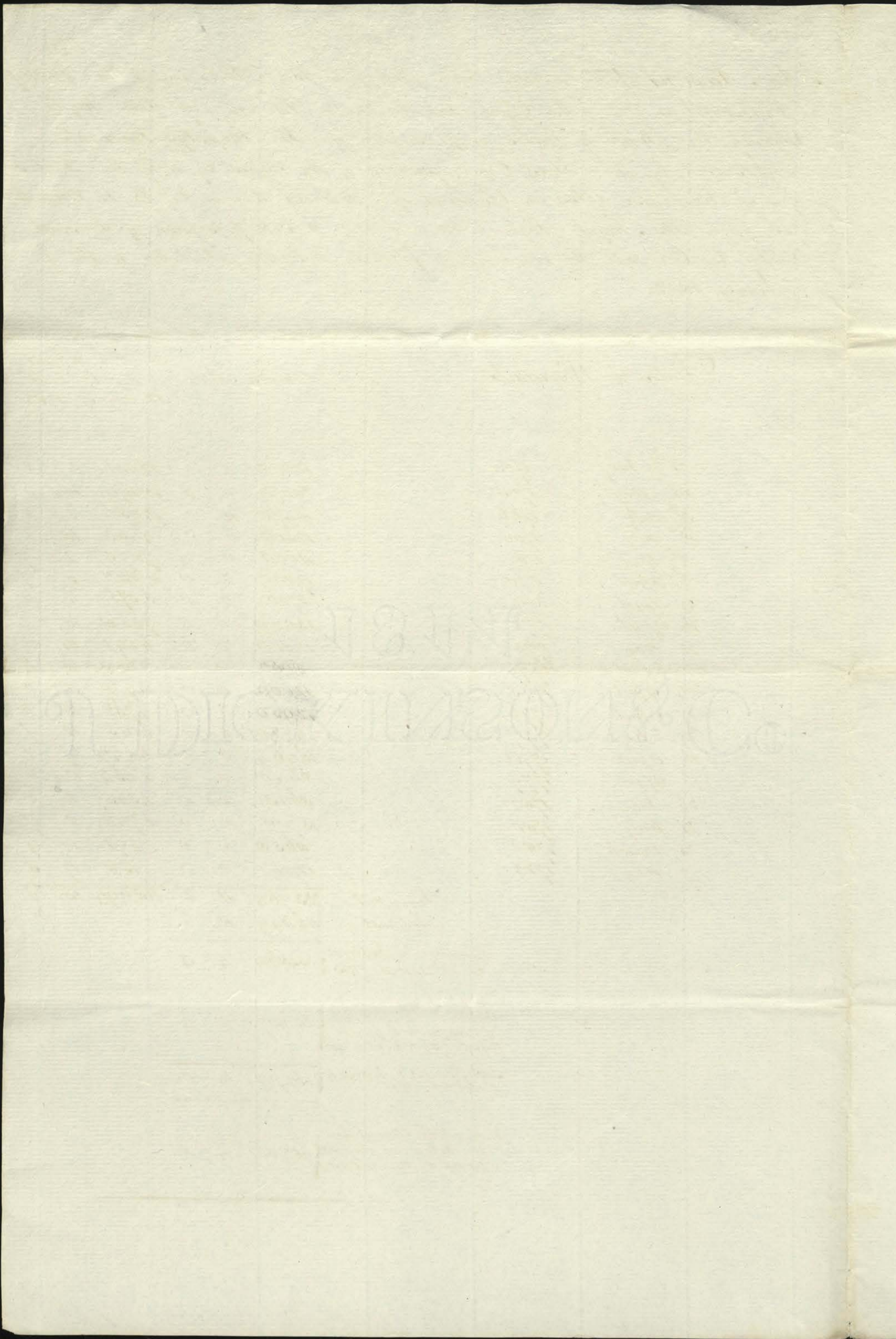

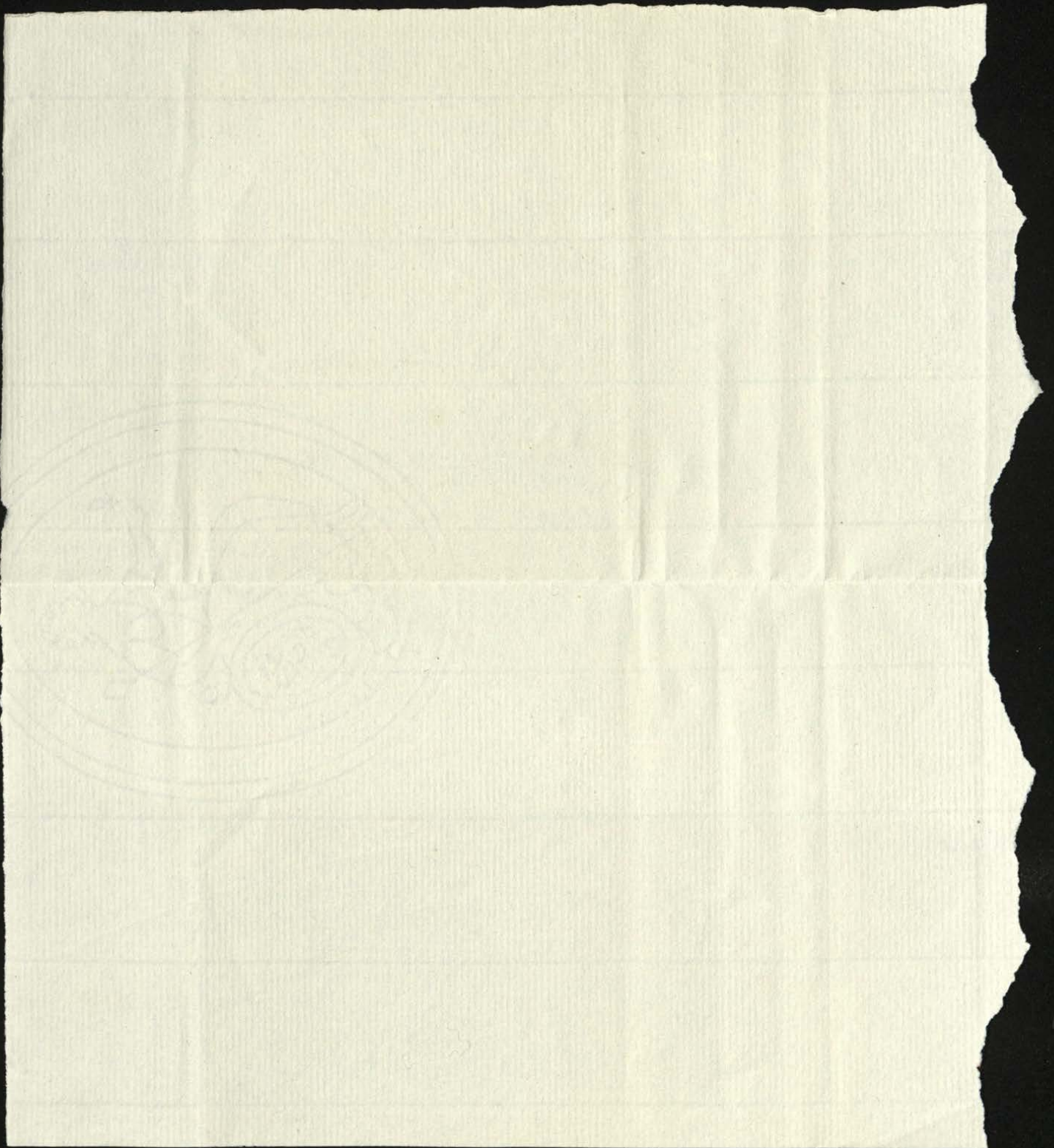

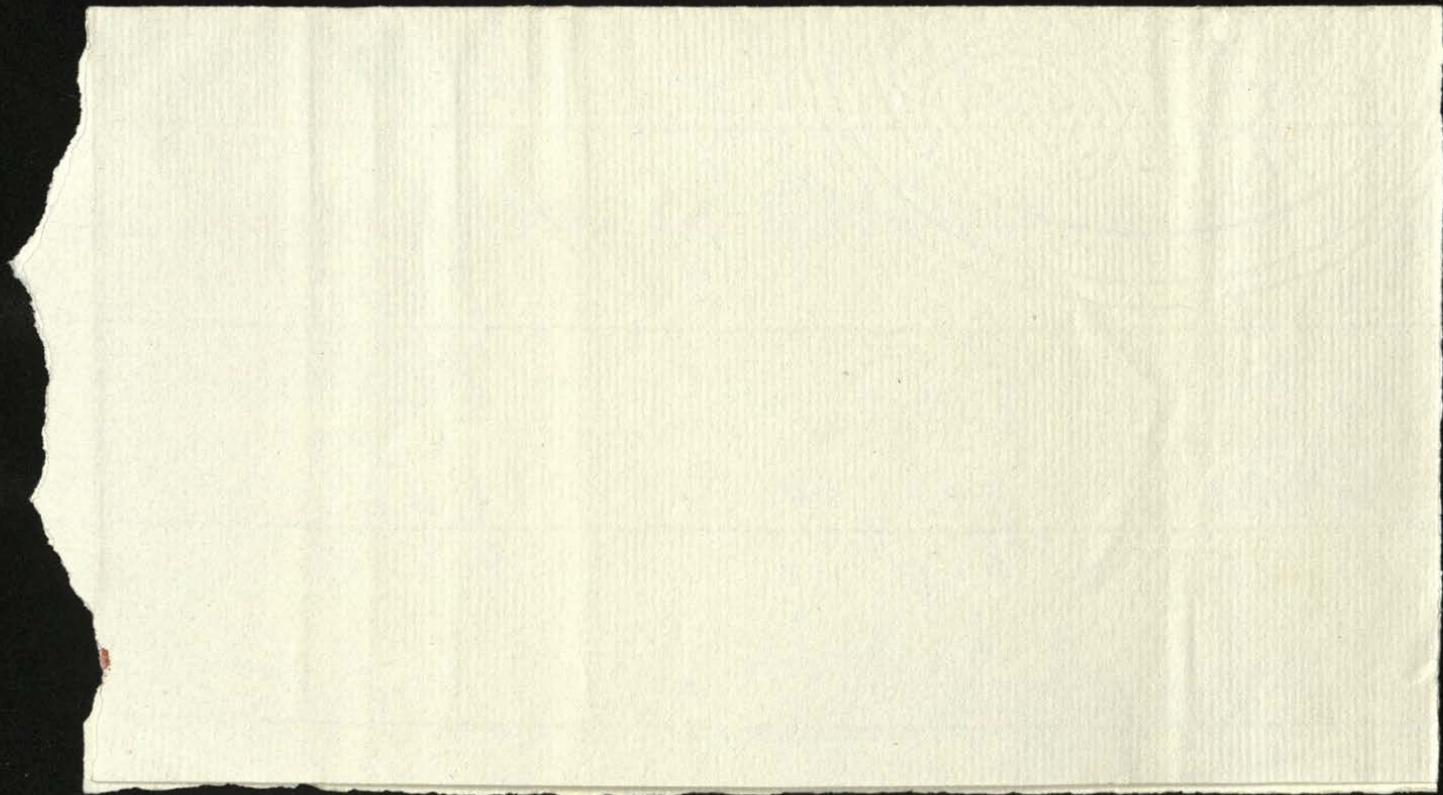
