

To Sir William Knighton Bartⁿ

Sir, I have seen Mr Danvers since my letter appealing to your recollection of my Actⁿ not being settled. and I learn from him that you say you are not acquainted with any of the particulars of it; I most respectfully beg to remind you that in May 1828 you was pleased to say you would settle the Actⁿ in a short time which had been delivered to you more than once, and I have waited patiently your pleasure, and a short time previous to the decease of His late Majesty (being then much in want of money) I waited on you at Windsor Castle for that purpose when you directed me to inform Sir Frederick Watson of my business which I did and afterwards I rec^d for answer from him that you would take an early

opportunity of settling it - what was meant
by balance of Account was in consequence of
the former account containing the particulars
of Corn Hay Straw and other expences ~~and~~
attending the Shipment of the Deer and
Kangaroos presented by His late Majesty
to the Pacha of Egypt - and sending to
Malta the Arabs &c which was deducted
from the account and afterwards paid
by the board of Green Cloth - and the
balance named was by deducting the
value of Birds & Kangaroos which I rec^d
by the order of the Marquis of Conyngham
from Windsor park to settle the acct^s
trusting this statement will readily bring
it to your recollection I remain
