

Memorandum 21<sup>st</sup> Feb. 1801

Mr. Harrison & Mr. Dawsons saw Capt.<sup>o</sup> Coode, by Appointment - Mr. H. stated to him that he had requested to see him for the purpose of informing him that he had heard that Capt. Coode had been openly talking of the Services he had performed under Sir W. Knighton, & especially as regarded the French Bonds, and that his Services were wholly un-req'd. - In reply, Capt.<sup>o</sup> Coode asserts, in the most positive terms, that he had never open'd his lips to any living creature on the subject of those Bonds, and that he had never mentioned Sir William Knighton's name in terms of Disrespect, - that, on the contrary, he felt Sir W.<sup>o</sup> Knighton's kindness to him on all occasions. - He then proceeded to state his interview with Gen.<sup>l</sup> Wheatley, who assur'd him that his name was sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office for the purpose of being put down as a Special Messenger on that Establishment, and refer'd him to Mr. Wash for further information, - that he in  
consequence

consequence subsequently saw Mr. Marsh, who confirmed what had been stated by General Whately; but added that his Salary would not exceed £35 a year, as he would not be entitled to the daily board wages paid to the Professors on the establishment who are in constant attendance on the King; but that nothing in regard to his situation could be finally settled, until the Civil List arrangements were completed -

Mr. Harrison suggested to him the propriety of his not committing himself in any way whatever by uttering complaints which might operate against his interests, and he inclined them to some hint who might otherwise feel disposed to do, to which suggestion Capt. Code promised to conform, and <sup>added</sup> that he should be at all times ready to attend upon Mr. Harrison and contradict, in the presence of his accusers, assertions of the description <sup>which</sup> now appeared to have been made

made against him
