Sir

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter Yesterday on my return to the Mint requesting to know my charge for engraving the Dies for the Royal Medal for the Royal Society, and the Cost of each Medal struck in fine Gold or Silver & also requiring to know the probable time when the Dies will be completed.

In answer to which I have to inform you that my Charge for executing the pair of Dies is 200 Guineas. Upon the Obverse of which is the Portrait of His Majesty George the Fourth & upon the Reverse the figure of Newton with such accompanying emblems as you may require.

The size of the Medal has been

very accurately calculated so as to make the Gold Medal including the striking to be in value 45 Guineas. and the Silver, Mounted similar to the Chiselden 5 Guineas each making together the sum of 50 Guineas, agreeable to the instructions which were given me by Sir Thomas Lawrence.

Supposing the Emblems to accompany the figure of Newton on the Reverse, to be similar to those which I have seen. I can engage to complete the work in ~~three~~ ^{two} Months of course supposing that no accident occurs in hardening these unusually large Dies the risk of which in this instance I take upon myself.

Should it be in my power to render any further information I shall be happy to wait upon you at any time you may appoint.
