With infinite Concern do I see by to Days Papers that the Correspondence as well as the Conversation between Lord Liverpool, a Marquis of Wellesley & Mr Lanning (not Lunning) is published. This is the first Time I ever remember such a Transaction being given out in the Public Prints, & I can not help reflecting with pleasure how well the dear King judged the Characters of those two Individuals, by proving themselves such as He always described them to men. think with Your Firmness all will do well, & shewing
steadiness of Principle the Country will stand by You
