The Chancellor, by going immediately to Westminster Hall on his return from the Country yesterday, had the misfortune not to see the Letter, your Royal Highness honoured him with, till late in the evening; or he would not have failed to have answered it for him.

He knows nothing of the King's Fall, but from Rumour; which represented it, as the slightest accident, which could be, of the kind. This account he was the more inclined to believe, as he had seen His Majesty appearing remarkably well on Friday last. Perhaps this may account in

some degree for its not being more
formally communicated to your
Royal Highness.

If, without compromising your
Royal Highness's name, He can learn
any thing, which may serve to afford
further explanation, He will intreat
your Royal Highness's permission to
lay it before you; trusting, that your
Royal Highness will forgive the
anxiety, you have often permitted
him to express, for the harmony of
the Royal Family; and with still more
confidence, that your clear judgement
of what was substantially requisite
on the occasion, will not be affected
with any kind of doubtful surmise, or
jealousy.
