Keepers of Newgate - Kings Bench - Fleet -
New Prison, New Prison, and New Prison,
laid before the Board accounts including
containing state of said Prisons, ^{and} Numbers,
Names and Descriptions of the prisoners
released from their several Prisons - Goal
of Newgate totally destroyed, nothing
left standing but bare walls - The
workmen repairing the old Cells, which
will be soon ready, and may hold about
thirty persons, - under the Piazza of the
Chappel is another place capable of holding
about

about the same Number - The Number of
Prisoners released from Newgate about
129 -

The Fleet Prison much damaged, except
the outside walls; but some Rooms, within
the walls, may be repaired and made
temporary Use of between this and the
next Term, about two Months hence - Number
of Prisoners, as deliver'd in, the first Day
of Term / 26th last Month, amounted to 767 -
Only 15 of the said Number Crown -
Prisoners, by which are meant those under
Judgment of the Court for Matters of
Crime. -

No damage done at New Prison, and
the same sufficiently strong for reception
and Custody of any Prisoners, who may be
committed - Number of Prisoners released
58. -

Prison of Newenwell Bidwell remains
in the former State, no damage having
been done there, except the Release of
the prisoners amounting to 119. Recommended
by the Lords to all the Keepers of the above
Prisons, to go round with a Magistrate
and such of their own officers, as they think
proper, to the several other Goals, and to
the Hospitals, in the course of this Day,
to see and examine Persons there, to
the End they may discover any of their
own

own former Prisoners, or other persons who were most active in joining or exciting the Mob, and to transmit Information to the Solicitor of the Treasury.

Order prepared and issued desiring the Lord Chief Baron to take the opinion of the Judges what may be the most speedy Method of bringing to Trial the several offenders who are now in Custody, charged with Treason and Felony committed during the late Tumults and Report the same to the Board.

Order prepared and issued to the Surveyor of the Board of Works to survey the several Prisons where any Acts of Violence have been committed, and to lay before the Board with all convenient speed an Estimate of the Damage, together with an Estimate of the Expence and Time necessary to put the same in such state of Repair as to be capable of receiving and securely guarding any prisoners who may be committed.

Adjourned until to Morrow Morning at ten o'clock.
