Letter from Lord
Amherst to Colonel
Twissleton of 13 June 1780

I have received the favor of your Letter of this date on the Subject of the Inhabitants of the City being permitted to carry Arms, and I cannot say more on the General Subject than I mentioned in my Letter to you of yesterdays date, which was a clear disapprobation of that part of the Lord Mayors Plan which regards the Arms.

If therefore any Arms are found in the Hands of persons, except they are of the City Militia, or are persons authorised by the King to be armed, you will please to order the Arms to be delivered up to you to be safely kept until further Order.
