I am much & very sorry to  
be disappointed at the letter I have  
just received from you after the  
messages I had received from the  
Prince of Wales through your  
brother Lord Beauchamp. In the  
first instance his R. H. called upon  
to join him in the park soon after  
the Election was over, & told him  
that as the Seal had cost him  
nothing he would voluntarily revert  
the two thousand pounds and  
commissioned him to tell me  
so. This Lord Beauchamp told  
you at the time the conversation  
passed, & afterwards he told the  
Prince of Wales in the name of the

wholly <sup>for my</sup> that they considered the  
relinquishment of this same as an  
obligation to them all. In the  
summer of 1790 when Lord Sandwich  
was at Brighton, Capt. Pague  
touch'd again upon the subject  
but upon hearing all the circumstances  
from him, the claim seem'd to  
be totally abandoned, as Mr Pague  
went from him to the Prince  
to recapitulate what had pass'd &  
not an hint or idea of claim  
for those two years has pass'd  
upon the subject. Under this state  
of things I should be sorry to  
see Mr Pague, I can say nothing  
that will be pleasant without I  
be ~~by~~ my own sense & my own feelings

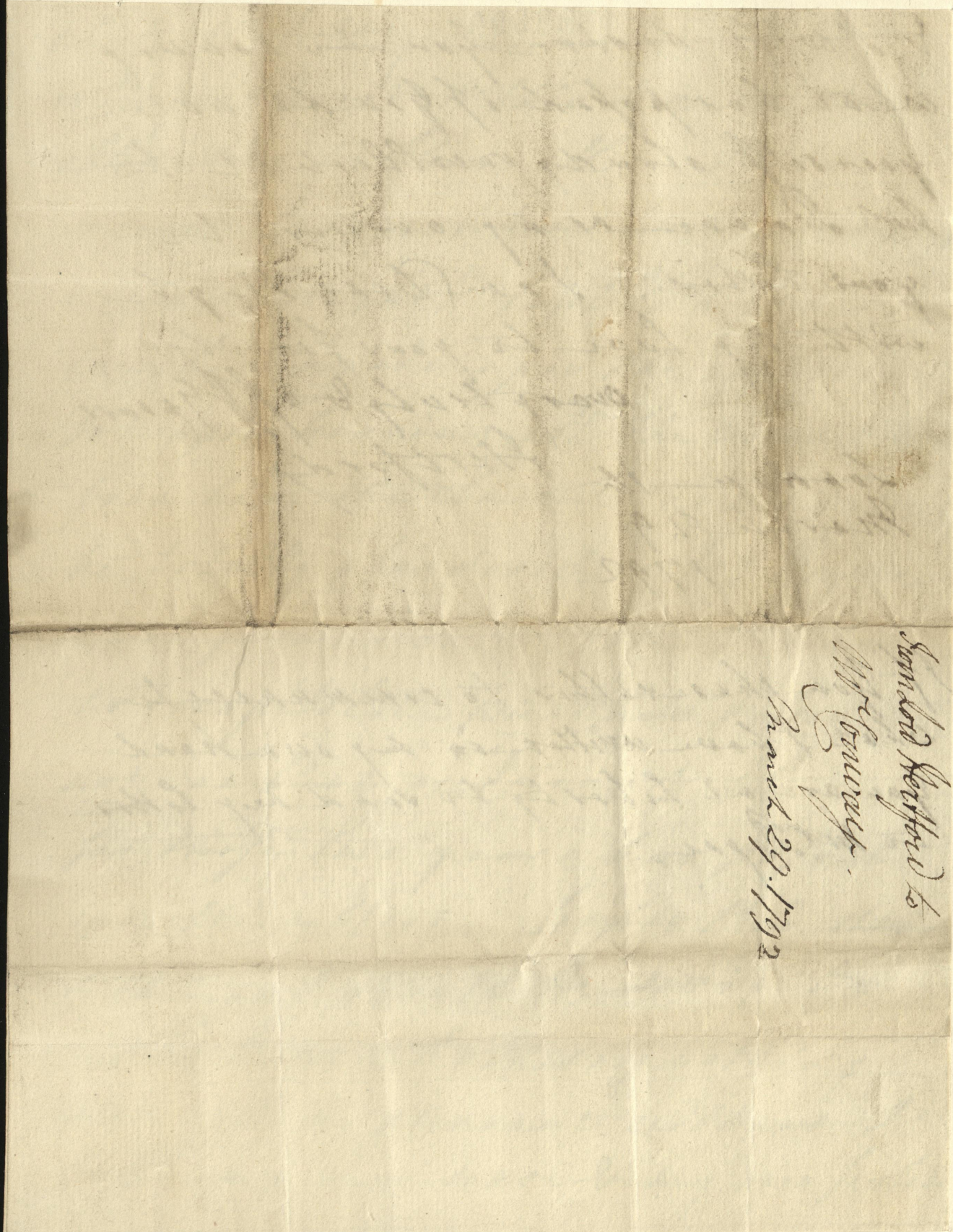
