I have just heard from Mr Robinson; he tells me that Lord Mansfield & Lord Leachborough have been with Lord North all this morning; that the speech has again been considered upon the advice of the two Chief Justices; that they thought it too tame, & like asking pardon; that Government should take an Indemnity, but not ask it, for doing what they say is right. He was debated at home all the morning in doing this, so that I advise your Majesty has neither seen him nor heard from him.

He has taken no step in return to the advices made by Opposition; & Mr Robinson doubts whether he ever will take any, or inform your Majesty of what has passed; Mr Robinson adds that he thinks I am

a true Prophet in having always said
that Lord North never meant to break
or to part with the smallest Degree of
Power

I thought ^{it} might be apprise your Ma-
jesty of all this, that you might be
prepared against you too Lord North or the
other Ministers.

I have heard nothing of the Reso-
lutions, so that I imagine they had nearly
as they did.
