not feeling myself at liberty
from the views I have of
the subject and the serious
consequences likely to result
from it, to keep from the
knowledge of His Majesty's
ministers, what appears to me
so materially to concern the
publick interest, I have stated
to them the communications
and correspondence which
have recently passed between

your Royal Highness and me. I
they are unanimously of opinion
that your Royal Highness's
letter cannot with propriety
be conveyed to His Majesty
by any of His confidential
servants. I perfectly acqui-
esce in that opinion, and
lose no time in humbly
laying before your Royal
Highness, the determination

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I feel it my duty to adopt.

It only remains for me to apologise to your Royal Highness for having obtruded upon your Royal Highness any opinions of mine, which I am assured have not in any degree coincided with your own, and to assure your Royal Highness, that I have the honour to remain, with great deference and respect,
