My dear Lord,

As the Petition of Right for the
wears of the Study of Law is at length
prepared according to the idea suggested to me,
(as you may recollect many years ago,) I have
thought it due to the habits in which I have
had the pleasure to be with you, & the kind
dispositions which you have shewn to me in
your late conversations with the King & with
myself, to apprise you of it, & to beg, that so
far as that can be properly asked, you will give
the business dispatch.

I wish also to convey to You, that my reason
for urging it now, is, to make it serve as the
means of facilitating the Plan of next year
of paying the debts, & particularly of relieving
me from the legal Proceedings, to which that
but of last year has left me exposed without
any means of discharging them. I desire
to have it perfectly understood that I do not
mean to claim these annuities for any other
purpose than to apply them to those demands
which the Public has been in some degree
subjected to, & to enable me to resume the situation
