Dr. Halmesbury, explain

With regard to the conver-
-sation with Lord Straalmsbury
I have this ^{day} questioned him,
he declares that he never
has open'd his lips upon it
to any body, but that had
he ever repeated it, he
could not ^{have} given it a
complexion so foreign to
the fact; therefore it must
have been either from
conjecture, or from mischie-
-vous Advice that the
Prince has put the
circumstances of my inter-
-view with Lord Straalmsbury
in so false a light.

I really am tired to
death of this silly altercation,
I could ^{almost} have dined at home
yesterday, for the first day
I had been unwell for
a long time past, but it
was impossible for me to do
it without discomfort

upon the footing upon which
things stand at present.
