Sir

One of your Royal Highness's Gentlemen having called to ask if I had any thing to transmit, I cannot on it writing by him tho' I have little to say. In consequence of my letter to L<sup>d</sup> Cholmondeley, I had an audience of the Princess last night. I stated the impossibility of your receiving from the Princess any Messages

that could be construed into imposing  
terms. At the same time I repeated what  
Your Royal Highness had expressed  
me to say was your spontaneous pur-  
-pose with regard to Lady Jersey. Lady  
Downland, who was present, said it  
was all that she ever imagined the  
Princeps could have wished. I spoke very  
strongly on the necessity of a final & dis-  
-tinct determination before Wednesday.
