

Windsor June 23. 1796.

My Dear Son, Yesterday Frederick put into my hands the papers of instructions you had given him, and a copy of the one you had given to the Earl of Moira that the Princeps might explicitly know your sentiments on a reconciliation. I should not do justice to the Earl of Moira's conduct on this most unpleasant business if I did not give my fullest approbation to the Object he has invariably had in view of effecting this desirable end with the most scrupulous attention to your Character as well as that of the Princeps.

I had just before Frederick came to Me received a letter from the Princeps, but not had time to open it, which now that I am fully possessed of your intentions I flatter myself will enable Me speedily to restore harmony into your House; for I find she begins to think the Public suppose her adverse to a reconciliation, this has enabled me rather to confirm that opinion and to point out to her the necessity of the whole being instantly settled that as you have on her representation consented that Lady Jersey shall retire from her service and not be admitted to her private society, there cannot be a shadow for the Princeps not instantly imploring you to return home, as it will be proper on both sides that both on meeting shall declare that no further mention shall be made of this business and the whole be forgot.

I cannot at the same time help expressing to You that no  
mistake may arise from the word private Society that I understand  
this excludes Lady Ferris not only being brought to Carlton House  
but to any other House where the Princess resides; but this  
cannot be an exclusion from Your Drawing Rooms or Public Assemblies;  
but this is not imposed as a condition, but is the secret advice  
I am call'd upon as a Sovereign and Father to give You, for  
a compliance with which Your Affection is a sufficient pledge.
