Mr. Ingham told me that your
Royal Highness was desirous to get General
Lake into the high Parliament, in order to
secure him from arrests. In order of effect-
ing this occurred to me. I proposed to Doyl
to vacate his seat, as he was about to
embark for foreign service: but I wrote
to Lord Granard to entreat that he would

bring in general Lake for the remainder
of the Parliament. Vyle with the most
humble readiness enclosed to Lord Granard
a letter soliciting from the Lord Lieutenant
the Excheatorship of Munster, the Office
correspondent to the Stewardship of the
Chiltern Hundreds. Lord Granard, in con-
sequence desires me to say that nothing
can ever be more grateful to his feelings
than to have the means of obaying a wish

of your Royal Highness. General Lake
will be brought in directly. But it will
be requisite that your Royal Highness
should secure from Mr Pelham the return
of General Lake for a Government out of
-reach when the General Election takes
place, as Lord Granard is under such
engagements as would not allow him to
bring in General Lake upon that
