Springton, May 2^d 1797.

My Dear Sir

I speculate so little
on your success in your pecuniary negocia-
-tion, that I told it almost ungenerous to
request that you will let George How-
-ard hear that you are out of that
eventual fund. One must, however, act on it
a necessary instruction from a Fed opinion
of the chance. I had written to my Mother
saying that she would cause a letter of

Authority to be sent to me by which I might
appoint a certain person to collect the Monia
rents that fell due yesterday. I have just
had a letter from her to say that the Person,
having subscribed to the Fund for giving Pemi-
-ons to those who will wear away their lives
in Ulster, is so anxious to the Country that
she entreats I will have no connection
with him. I tell you this to show you
that there is not a possible delay which
does not fall upon me. For I must now

point out to her some other person, & wait
for the coming over of the document for my
signature. I shall be in town on Mon-
-day next, if nothing calls me up earlier.
Will you take the trouble of calling upon
Parsons, Picture-Cleaner, a few doors above
Lord Coventry's in Piccadilly, and desire
him to send hither immediately a Man
whom he said he could trust to clean &
repair such Pictures as were not of the

first stamp. The rest shall be sent up to
London to Parsons. I have been busy in
hanging them here in order to fix upon their
places before the rooms are painted.
