Letter of 15 June 1797

It is to be regretted that letters come forth in such

junction against what has happened.
had the laxity of one other individual
is alone in fault.

I am informed
that the House of Lords in Ireland is to

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that a Vote of Censure upon me for my statements
respecting that Country. Not being a Deser-
-vate, I shall regret their taking the step.

For my ground is so firm that they will of

the contest only mark an opposition of

interest between themselves & the Nation.

I shall be on the spot at the time, as I

understand the Parliament will not

meet for business till the 9th of February.

Street Dublin, at six weeks after date.
