My Dear General

Royal Highness decide as to time

to Lord. I have peculiar reasons for
thinking that he had not, two or three
days ago, any notion of such a proceed
on the part of Pitt as what you have
mentioned. Persons of his intimate society
opined strongly, speculating on probable
recipities, against such restrictions
as were proposed for a Report here
- fore. The Ministers cannot play double with
the Prince; therefore I give them no credit
for their purpose. Faithfull yours
