addressed to those Gentlemen by His
Royal Highness on the 10th of June, His
Majesty's Servants humbly request Permission
to refer His Royal Highness to the
Physicians themselves for the true Meaning
of those Answers, which appear to have
been understood by His Royal Highness in

a sense, different from that, which, it has
been represented to His Majesty's Servants,
was intended to be conveyed.

They have now the Honour and
Satisfaction to transmit to His Royal
Highness the Sentiments of His Majesty's
Physicians expressed on Saturday last, by
which it happily appears that, in the
Judgement of The Physicians, His
Majesty is well.

His Majesty's Servants
entertain [they trust on just Grounds]
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^a
confident Hope of the Continuance of His
Majestys Health, and they have only to
add that, if, unhappily, that Hope should
be disappointed, their Conduct will be
directed by a most anxious Desire Faith-
fully to discharge all the Duties to His
Majesty and the Public, which, under
such Circumstances, would be imposed
upon them.

The Lord Chancellor begs Leave
to add that he should be conscious that
he acted with a most blameable Want
of

of Respect towards His Royal Highness,
if he did not humbly beg Permission
to advert to the Paragraph in his Royal
Highness's Letter, in which His Royal
Highness intimates that previous to the
30th May he had received no official
Communication upon the important
Subject of it, and to mention that, in
addition to the Communication personally
made by Mr Addington, as His
Majesty's Servants understood, it was
most

most anxiously directed that His Royal
Highness should receive a daily Communi-
cation of the State of His Majesty's Health,
in the manner thought likely to be most
satisfactory, that is, by the daily personal
Attendance of some of His Majesty's
Physicians upon His Royal Highness.
This Attendance His Majesty's Servants
also understood to have been afterwards
discontinued with His Royal Highness's
Approbation: and The Physicians would
have intreated His Royal Highness's

Permission to resume their Attendance,
if any Change had taken place, which
affected the Judgement they entertained
of the prospect of His Majesty's complete
Recovery.
