My Dear Colored

I have many thanks to return you  
for your letter of the 17<sup>th</sup>. with its enclosure. Your the  
answer is much such a one as I expected. It says nothing.  
H<sup>r</sup>. Grey called upon me a day or two after I received it, &  
I offered to fetch it from my room for his perusal, but he  
declined looking at it, saying it was a matter of no consequence  
whatever to him.

I sincerely hope the Indication for a Reconciliation is  
sincere; & yet if it is so, I cannot conceive why it is to be  
defered so long, before it is carried into execution. Can the King  
be really well, if his Nerves are so easily affected, as not to bear  
an interview with a Person, to whom he anxiously wishes to be  
reconciled? No such difficulties were made to his interview  
with H<sup>r</sup>. Pitt. I hope the Prince will keep clear, till either  
the Interview takes place, or He has the Wish for Reconciliation

conveyed to him directly from the King himself. For anxious as  
as you know I have ever been that such a cordial reconciliation  
should take place, yet nothing could give me so much, as to see  
the Prince Depd by designing Persons holding at such a time  
to him falsely, without having any authority to do so.

I see from the Papers that the Duke of Cumberland is again  
to succeed General Fox in the Home District. Now I do not rejoice  
at this Change; I should have liked H: R: H: continuing in his former  
Capacity better. I hope he will make no mistake during this present  
Hildesby Election.

The Papers have likewise informed me of Lord Hawke's  
Demise. I have written to congratulate him on the Occasion, & to  
express a hope that he will not go thro' Clerical, without affording  
the Duke & an opportunity of being introduced to Lady London.  
If he should come North again (which however L<sup>d</sup> Grey's family says is  
not to be the case) & there is any thing to communicate to me, pray  
remember that sometimes in his hurry Lord Hawke forgets to do so, as  
was the case last year, when he wholly forgot to say one word to

I suppose the Prince will soon set off for Brighton.  
I beg you will present my Dutiful Respects to H: H: H: & assure  
him of the continuance of my attachment to him.
