Dear Sir

There are two matters which are too inconsiderable to trouble H. R. H upon, but which if you would mention to him at some moment when he is perfectly at leisure, I should be much obliged to you.

The first is an application from Mr. Philips of Grosvenor Place, a Gentleman to whom I am under some obligations, for a Chaplainship for his Son. He has a notion that the Prince is unlimited in the number of his Chaplains, and besides would be particularly proud that his Son should be Chaplain rather, to H. R. H. than to any Peer. —

The second business is one on which I once troubled H. R. H. myself, but concerning which I now know some more

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particulars than I did at that time. I
have inquired lately concerning the use that
is made of the game in Bagshot Park
& I find that now that P. William of
Gloucester is absent, nobody ever shoots
there except the Gamekeepers. This being
so I should imagine that there could be
no objection to giving leave to any friend
of the Prince, to have two or three Days
spent there in the course of the winter, &
the D. of Gloucester having once sent me
for answer to an application I made, that
the shooting there was kept for the P. of
Wales, I cannot of course apply through
any other channel than that of H. R. H.
himself. -- If the P. could get one
permission for a day or two at different

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periods of the Season, it would be a great
pleasure to me, but you will easily believe
I should be very sorry that he should take
any step on my account that would be in
the smallest degree unpleasant to himself.
