Thank you, my Dear General, for the Sent.  
Perhaps, if the matter be in other respects well  
understood, that is the arrangement which  
would suit best. The settlement of the  
Prince's affairs is in favour of as would  
be hoped. I think he might make his  
living about 50,000. The difference in his  
own expenditure would be little, & it  
would be great in the operation of the  
thing. I send you the enclosed paper as

I received it, because the Prince can no more

being apprized of it. Judge for yourself whe-  
ther you will present the letter or not.  
As she claims a title of connection with me / she  
desires I would read the letter / I must say there  
is not a spark of affinity between her family  
& mine; I never saw her in my life; & I know  
no more of her than I have heard from you.
