My Dear Col:

I was sincerely grieved to find your few Letter of the 24th, that you had been so much indisposed. I really believe there has been something in the air extremely irritable to the human Constitution. As for myself, I have been well these days together during the last three months; but my Complaint has been entirely rheumatic.

I feel much obliged to you for the Intelligence you have given me, & the more so, as I have received hardly any Letters from any of my friends, for a great length of time. Indeed nobody could afford me so much authentick Information as yourself. I confess I am much surprised at the Minister's continuing to make the S: of York's not Concurring the best answer a sine qua non of his Continuance in Office. So this I stand thinking the King never will consent; & after it has been so publicly declared that His Majesty has actually signed his Appointment, the surely never will consent to cancel it &

please Mr Pitt. If he does, I suppose he will see how the Duke
of York can possibly avoid flinging up all his opportunities, &
relying as the Duke of Cumberland did, on a similar effort
being put upon him by the General's Father. As for the dispute
about the D: of Cambridge, it is surely impossible for the King
to give way in that, after the Proclamation published ~~at~~ however
