Sir,

It is with the greatest pleasure & satisfaction I congratulate Your Majesty on the Queen's safe delivery on the 22<sup>d</sup> instant, a day already propitious to Your Majesty. I received the news of this happy event by a letter from the General, dated that same day, in which he mentions, that the Queen was as well as could possibly be expected, & my little Brother likewise. I think that, whether it had been a Brother or a Sister, it would have given equal pleasure; but I confess, as to myself, I am more happy it is a Boy, because, when he grows up, he may be more useful to his country.

Will your

Majesty be so good as to give my duty, & my sincere congratulations to the Queen, & my love to all my Brothers & Sisters.

We all empesed to get out of Torbay, but were driven in again by contrary winds; since that time we have had fourts Martial, held every day on board the Prince George. A man, belonging to the Poudroyant, was sentenced to receive 300 Lashes, for having struck his Officers; & four Deserters from the Valiant were condemned to death, not only for their desertion; but for High Treason in appearing in open arms against their King, & Country, having been taken on board a French Privateer.
