I have heard nothing of the particular Transactions of the Chancery, I hear however that His Language is firm & manly, as it ought to be, I am told that Lord Weymouth is for a Negotiation with the Rockingham's, & wants for himself a quiet Place; Lord Howe is said to incline more to another Quarter, & seems to wish for Authority & Power; Mr. Phipps is as usual very timid & wants to give every thing up to the Rockingham's; but like all timid Men, He frequently changes his opinion, as He did yesterday upon a Conversation with Mr. Robinson; The Advocate is too apt to incline to the Sentiments of Mr. Phipps. is very anxious for some permanent Provision
but gives up all thoughts of continuing in
Administration. Mr Robinson thinks that
we shall have a better Majority on Friday
next than we had the last. I thought
it right to give your Majesty this account
of the State of things, as far as I am
inform'd of them, that your Majesty may
be apprized of them, before you see any
one today. I have just heard that the
Parliament had yesterday long conference
with the Duke of Richmond & Mr Fox
in the House of Lords. I hope that
your Majesty's health is mended.
