sincerely I am,

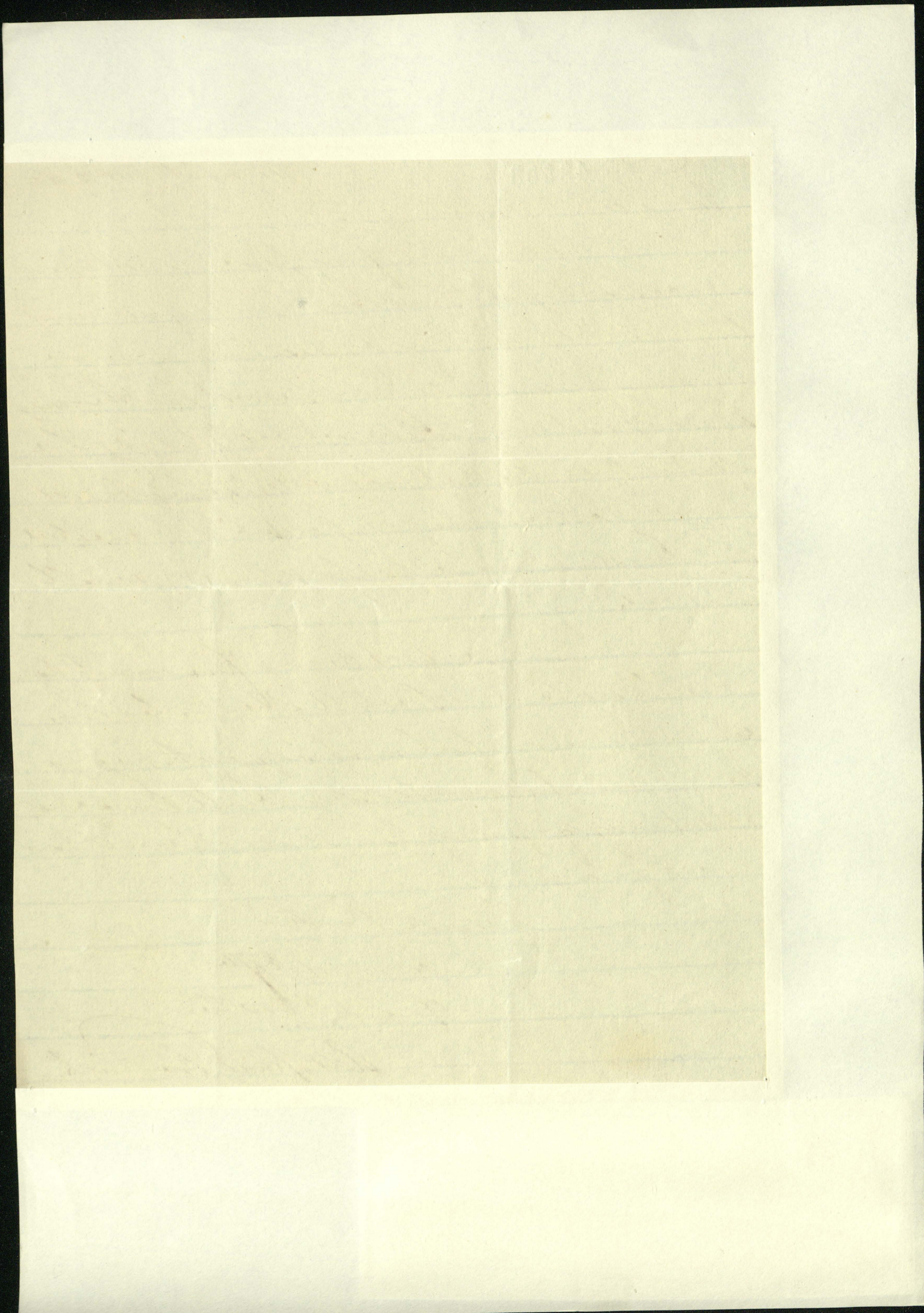

I must trouble you with a few lines to inform you that I am at last able to find the day when I can have the pleasure of waiting upon you at Brighton. The review at Beahill is to take place on Thursday next, and from thence Frederick goes to Exeter, & from after seeing the troops there on Friday morning he goes on to Brighton. I shall leave this ^{at six} to-morrow evening or early in order to be at Beahill on Wednesday night.

Should you be at home I shall certainly stop for a moment at Brighton to enquire how you are, & on Friday return there to pass a few days with you if you will allow me. Be assured, my Dearest Brother I feel very happy at the thoughts of seeing you again, and at being able at last to be with you on an engagement which has been a very long time my wish.

All the family here are well except

Sophy who was seized on yesterday with the
in her head. She suffered dreadfully till she was
blooded, but since that the evening has been gradually
going off & I left her last night much more
comfortable, & think she had some sleep. Anger
is very well, & leaves us on Wednesday for
Toucan. The whole family go on Friday next to
Milton Abby till Monday, & on Friday evening
they leave Weymouth for Newmarket to stay
there till the apartments at Windsor are ready.
