My Lord,

I send your Lordship ten letters, every one of which will be found to contain sentiments that reflect honour on the Princess Charlotte, as they shew the sincerity of her convictions, at one period of her life, and of her resolutions, and endeavours to amend. Your Lordship can hardly conceive how painful it has been to me to copy the letters out, as it has been the means of bringing before me what might have been done, ^{at one period} ~~at one period~~ if every body had cooperated with your Lordship, in promoting the only object that ought to have been in view. the real good and religious improvement of your Royal Pupul. G^d forbid that the moment should be gone, by irrevocably. But alas! much time has been lost; and difficulties have been raised which human wisdom, and human strength will find it hard to overcome.

If your Lordship wishes I can send further copies. The letters I selected were such as stood by themselves and could be understood without any explanation. Only one seemed to call for elucidation - it refers to a letter I wrote H. B. H. on recovering from the illness I had in 1806. A copy of that letter I have sent. It is of a serious cast: but surely it reflects credit on her Royal Highness's goodness that being so serious, it still was one, she ~~has~~ set so much value by, as to wish not to part with it
