she presents herself - I must
confess that I think the re-
sentment goes deep, and will
not be eradicated in any length
of time - but Myself thought
cannot want zeal to serve
your Royal Highness after the
extreme consideration and
kindness which you have shown
her - I am going to write to

Myself thought a letter of comfort
and encouragement as far as I
can give it her, and have only
to intreat your Royal Highness
not to allow this subject at
least to aggravate the ten
thousand cases which must
press upon you at this mo-
ment - any further -

have thought it best not to give
the slightest hint of these having
been any new impediment in
the way of Her Graces recovery
