

Hered. Princess of Württemberg

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Sir

I am too happy to seize every opportunity of assuring Your Majesty of my respect and attachment to neglect writing to you by M<sup>r</sup> Wyckham who has been here since yesterday and has undertaken to send this letter safe from Frankfurt. He remained here on purpose to see me as he thought it might be agreeable to Your Majesty to have some accounts from hence. M<sup>r</sup> Wyckham spent the evening and slept with us. I understand that M<sup>rs</sup> Wyckham is here also but too unwell to appear.

It gave me great pleasure to hear

that Your Majesty has been at the Shore as  
 I think your glorious Fleet deserves every  
 encouragement and nothing could be more  
 flattering to them than your visiting  
 them at this time of Year. I hope that  
 the Weather was favorable for your  
 excursion as nothing adds so much as  
 the Sun to the beauty of the sight.

On the whole we have fine Weather for  
 the time of Year which is a great blessing  
 on account of the poor as all Fuel is  
 so amazingly dear and there is nothing  
 burnt here but either Wood or Peat. But  
 we trust that the Peace will make

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every thing fall in price; as the Peasants  
by furnishing the Armies have got very  
rich and every body else suffers from their  
high demands.

Since I had the happiness of writing  
to Your Majesty I have had the honour  
to receive a Letter from you for which I  
should sooner have expressed my thanks  
did I not fear to be troublesome by  
writing too often as I know that when  
Frederick first went to Germany you  
ordered him to write once in three weeks  
and as far as I can I try to keep to  
that rule.

The Prince begs that I will present

to Your Majesty and I have the honour  
to be with the greatest respect and  
attachment.
