Sir

I am quite afraid you will be  
tired of my numerous Letters but I cannot  
avoid returning you thanks for your Note  
of December 10<sup>th</sup> which a Son of M<sup>r</sup>  
Spencer Stanhope has just delivered into my  
Hands - Happy should I feel if I could  
flatter myself that Colonel Bloomfield  
had succeeded in his Negotiation, but fear  
from the Letter Prince Paul brought me  
from Conest there is little hopes that the  
Duke of Cumberland will return as he  
ought to England. The Divorce of the  
Princeps Solms is much talked of and  
matters are very uneasy as I dread that

Ernest will forget what he owes to the  
Prince Regent and will obstinately persist  
in a marriage which must be a source  
of pain to the whole family. I hope  
that you will soon be able to quit  
the Continent and that you will find  
the Prince Regent and the rest of the  
family in good health. - I am glad to  
hear that Princess Charlotte has been  
convinced and hope that the serious  
reflections she will have made on that  
occasion will through life be of use to  
her, and make her feel doubly what  
she owes to her Father. I remain
