Sir Thomas

It gave me pleasure to hear
four days ago from Adolphus that you were
on your road to London, and hope by this
time that you have not only paid your
duty to the Prince Regent, but also at
Windsor to the Queen, and Princess, who
I am sure out of kindness to me will
have tormented you with ten thousand
questions about Stutzward and every thing
that concerns me. I flatter myself that
in a few days you will receive two
letters that I addressed to you at Hanover
and which my Brother Adolphus has
kindly promised to have forwarded to
England by a safe opportunity. Of course

we have heard nothing he has not answered
my Letter and it is said that he is still
at Stettin but intends going to Berlin.
By the contents of my Letters you will
see Sir that I am anxious to keep you
acquainted with the various events which
take place here, which succeed each other
very rapidly. — After the interest you were
so obliging as to shew concerning a variety
of trifles which notwithstanding are of
importance to me. I think it but just
to acquaint you Sir that Yesterday I
was made very happy by Count de
Deppelins receiving a very handsome one Letter
from Lord Castlereagh in answer to the
one I mentioned having engaged the King
to have written, this Letter has given us
both great satisfaction as it is a proof

of my Brother the Prince Regent regard for
the Duty and affection for me. The Duty is
now employed in looking out for a Gentleman
who is likely to suit as Minister at the
Court of St James's. I hope that he will
soon meet with a Gentleman that will be
proper for such an appointment by whom
I shall not fail to write to my whole
family and to whom I shall give a
Letter of recommendation for you. May I
beg of you Sir to send me your direction
that I may not always be obliged to
trouble Eliza with my Letters for you.
I am happy in having this occasion
to assure you of my regard and remain
