My dearest Brothers

I hope that you will have forgiven the bad scandal that I sent you last week, but I was so very unwell at the moment I wrote with Cramps in my Stomach that it was hardly in my power to finish my Letter. In fact it is very natural that the wonderful events which have taken place should affect all, particularly those who like myself see every thing at stake. God grant that the military preparations which all are

ambitions to complete may be crowned with
success and ward off the blow which seems
to threaten all Europe. Great Britain
alone can enable the other Sovereigns to
support the expense of this Campaign on
which must depend the future political
existence of all the Allies - I understand
that Napoleon has more Troops than it
was imagined he could in so short a time
have assembled, two hundred and fifty
thousand and are already under arms and
within a Month or more more will
be ready to follow his Eagles God grant
that before this time the Allies may
