My dearest Brother

Having just heard of the
danger you were exposed to, on your return
from the House of Lords, it is impossible for
me to pass under silence an event which
might have had such dreadful consequences.

I rejoice most sincerely at your having escaped
unhurt, and trust that all well intentioned
Englishmen will unite their efforts to put a
stop to the spirit of Anarchy which has
shewed itself so violent of late. God grant
my dearest Brother that the Nation may
feel the danger which threatens our glorious
Constitution and may resist the crisis for

Reform and alterations which must at this
time undermine the very principles of your
Government, if they were attended to.

I am very glad to find that you have
persuaded the Queen to put off having a
Drawingroom, as I should think it might
fatigue her; but above all should there be
any more Acts it would be terrible to have
her exposed to any hurry at her time of life.
